

Welcome to the latest edition of our weekly newsletter.





Year 7

More outstanding homework submitted this week from our fantastic year 7 cohort. Keep working hard; the possibilities are endless.




Year 8



Year 10 Prefects

I am very pleased to announce that year 10 will be able to apply for the prestigious position of Prefect at Cecil Jones Academy. There is also the opportunity to be a 'Head Prefect' for any one of our exceptional candidate.

What is a prefect?

A prefect is essentially a student leader, a representative of the student body who takes on the responsibility of supporting the school, assisting with the smooth day to day running of particular areas through 'prefect duty', representing at school and community events and liaising with staff and senior teams as a voice for the students.

Why become a prefect?

Prefects within a school hold an esteemed position that shows a high level of responsibility and trust. Future employers, colleges will recognise the skills held by those that have held the position of prefect and will look upon this favourably when considering you for a place on a course or for a job role. You will be actively involved in school events and will be a voice for the students during consultations.

To be a prefect, you will need to demonstrate that you are: responsible, disciplined, trustworthy, (have) good communication skills, can work as part of a team, can follow instructions, can offer ideas.

How to apply:


Write a paragraph outlining why you are a suitable candidate for the role of Prefect. Offer an explanation of 'why' you want to be a prefect and 'the skills' you have to be able to fulfil the role. Detail any experience you have of responsibility - this may be, looking after younger siblings, being part of a sports team or club etc. If you are interested in the role of 'Head Prefect' please make this clear in your application. Submit through the assignment on Google Classroom, or handwritten and submitted to Miss Nicholls. I look forward to receiving all of your applications Year 10. The deadline is Monday 5th October. Good luck.





Year 11
